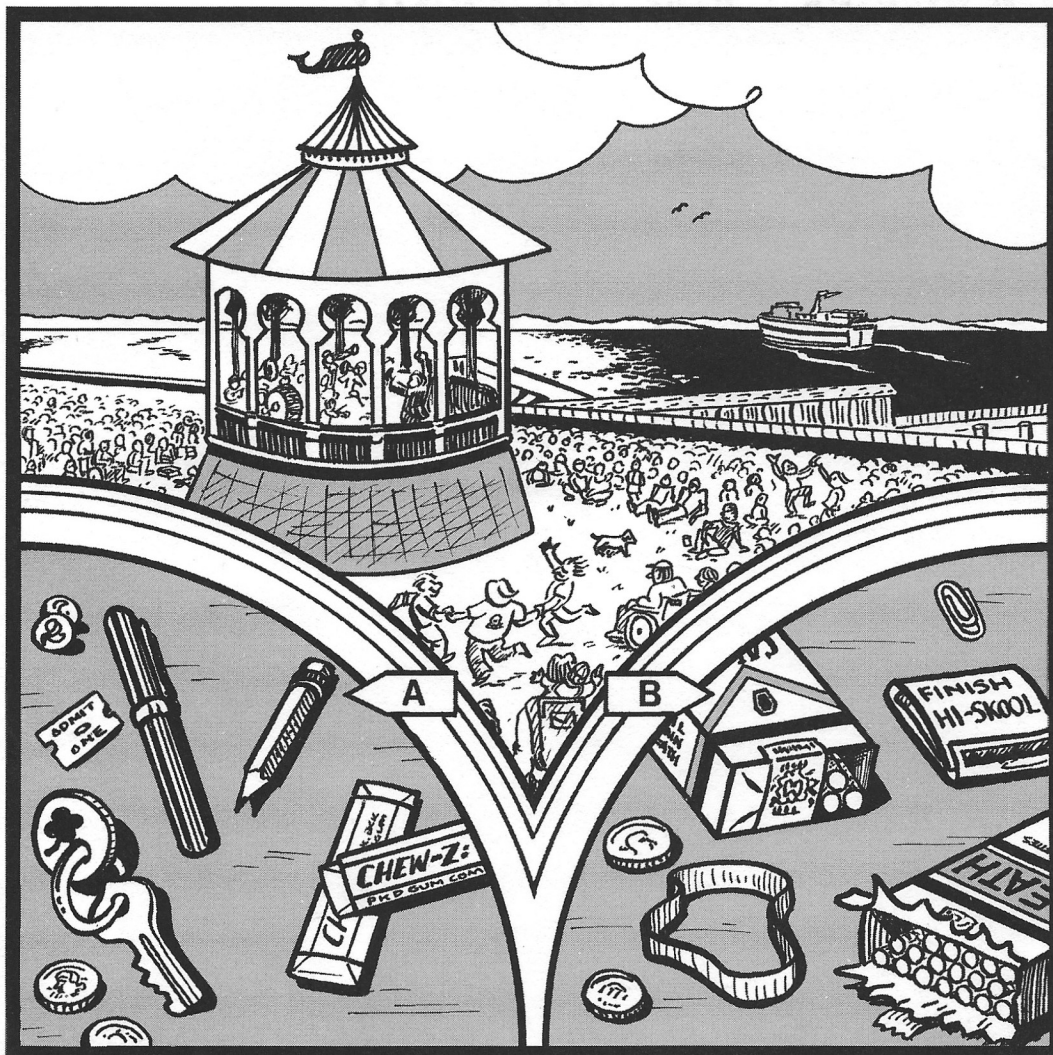


BANG, BANG!
