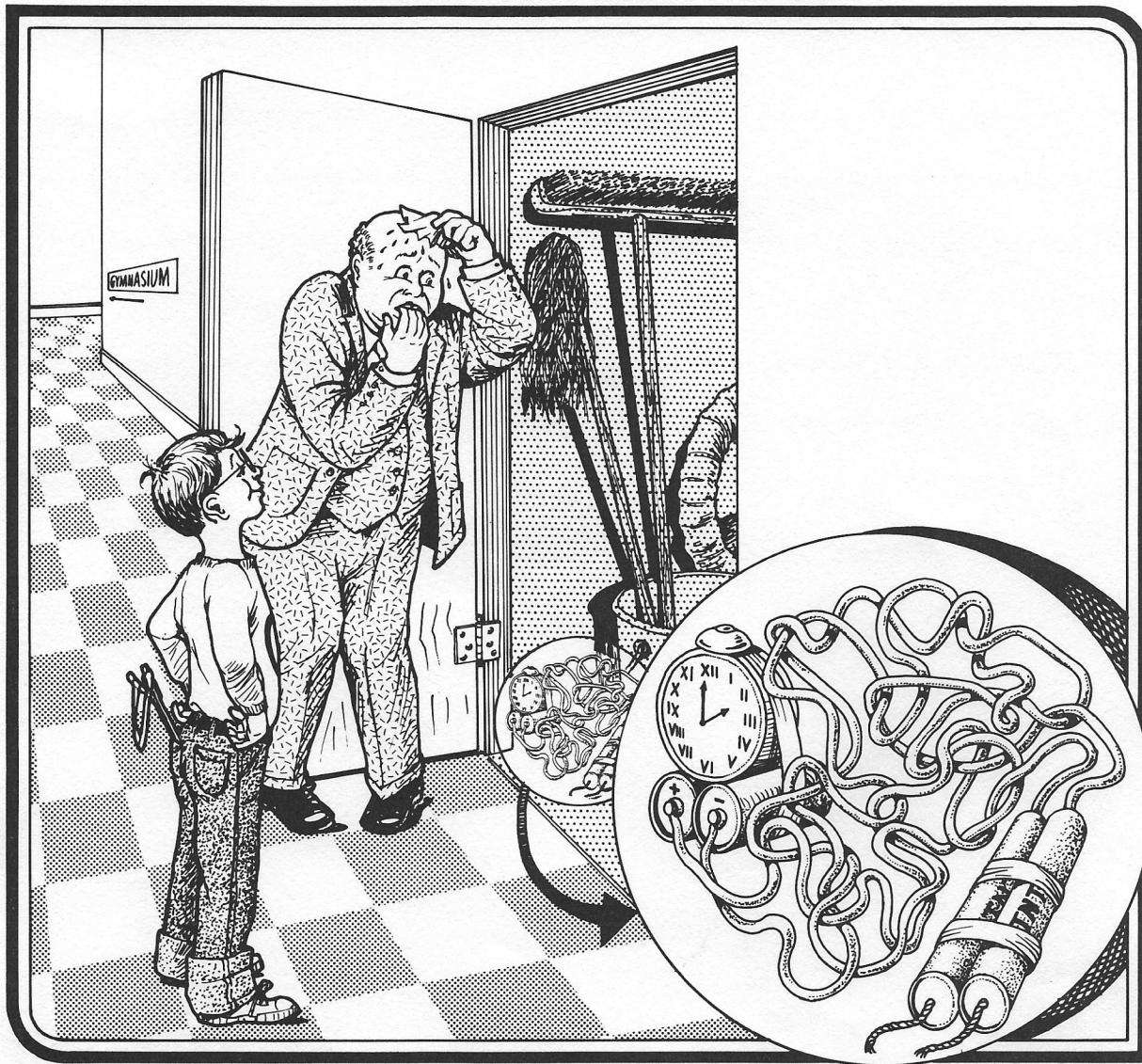


BOMB SIGHT
